Rowena Rhodes Stewart, DH departed this life September 19, 2015. She was born on March 6, 1932 in Jacksonville, Florida, the only child of the late Essie Brazle Rhodes and Oliver Rhodes. She grew up in New Berlin and graduated from Edward Waters College in 1955. She went on to receive her Doctor of Humanities from the University of Rhode Island.



In 1953 she met and married Clarence Dale Johnson in South Carolina and to this union four children were born.

She will join in Heaven her beloved daughter, Wanetta Johnson. She leaves to cherish her memory: one daughter, Gwendolyn Brittian, two sons, Clarence Johnson (Roberta Johnson) and Alvie Johnson (Claudette Johnson) seven grandchildren, 14 great grandchildren and a host of loved ones and friends.



THE HISTORY MAKER

She began her career doing social work with the Florida State Welfare Department and in Boston Massachusetts as the Director of the Harriett Tubman House. She later went on to become one of the most sought after African American museum directors in the country.



In 1975, Stewart became the first director of the Rhode Island Black Heritage Society in Providence. In 1985 she was selected by the Mayor of Philadelphia as the Director and Curator of Philadelphia's Afro-American Historical and Cultural Museum. In 1992, Stewart moved to Detroit to head the Motown Historical Museum and three years later, she was recruited to Kansas City, Missouri where she oversaw the development of the American Jazz Museum and ultimately becoming its Executive Director upon completion in 1997.



In 2002, she retired and moved back home to Jacksonville where she served for a time as President of the A.L. Lewis Historical Society Board and Coordinator of the American Beach Community Center and Museum on Amelia Island north of Jacksonville.
