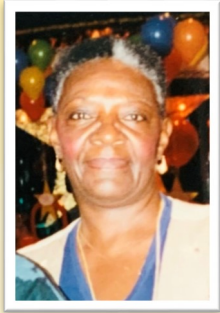

Doris Harris Henry, 91, was born April 22, 1929 to the late John Harris and Annie Mae Roberson in Jacksonville, Florida.
