

William's earthly fight to give this world everything he was purposed to, never stopped until God called him home on April 9, 2021 at 6:45 p.m. as he was surrounded by family and friends at Orange Park Medical Center.

William was a member of the Bethel Institutional Baptist Church, where he participated in various youth ministries. Also, William expressed his love of community through his volunteerism. He served faithfully and regularly at Clara White Mission, and he could always be counted on to donate his time and youthful energy to the Duval Teacher's United with various activities.
